## **Your Recommended Reads**




#### 1. French Exit by Patrick deWitt

A once-wealthy widow and her adult son flee New York for Paris with their cat—who may or may not be her reincarnated husband. Strange but grounded, with a sharp, human core beneath the oddball exterior.

### **Core Traits:**

- Absurdity: Unexpected turns, quirky logic, surreal flavour
- Relatability: Real people, familiar settings, social awkwardness




# 2. The Family Fang by Kevin Wilson

A brother and sister raised by performance artists struggle with adulthood. It's part family drama, part comic absurdity, with real emotional weight beneath the oddness.

#### Look For:

- Everyday situations with a twist
- Humour rooted in awkward truth
- Writers who turn small things into comic spirals



### 3. The Idiot by Elif Batuman

A brilliant but socially awkward student fumbles through first love, linguistic theory, and the absurdity of everyday conversation. Funny, dry, and grounded in the surrealness of normal life.

# Avoid: One Day by David Nicholls

Though it has comic moments, it's more romantic and emotionally earnest than absurd. If you prefer your realism bent out of shape, this may feel too straight.
